Infinity Scarf

Approximate Finished Size: 9" x 35" (circumference)
Makes 3 scarves

A luxurious and beginner friendly project! Make one for yourself and a few more to pamper your friends.

Fabric Requirements

• 1 yard Luxe Cuddle[®] (makes 3 scarves)

Suggested Notions

- 90/14 stretch machine needle
- Hand sewing needle
- Polyester thread
- Felt tip marker and/or ballpoint pen
- Rotary cutter and mat
- Micro-serrated scissors
- Craft knife
- Long, flower head pins
- Stiletto
- Walking foot



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Cuddle® Infinity Scarf

Approximate Finished Size: 9" x 35" (circumference)




Cutting

1. Mark an 18" x 36" rectangle on the wrong side of Luxe Cuddle®, parallel to the selvedge.


Note: By cutting parallel to the selvedge, you can make 3 scarves.

2. Cut the Cuddle® along the lines.




Assembly

- 1. Mark a 5" turning gap on one long edge. Mark a corresponding 5" gap on the opposite edge.
- 2. Staystitch between the marks on both sides, ½" from the edge.



- 3. With right sides together, fold the fabric in half lengthwise.
- 4. Double pin along the edge.



5. Sew the edge, making L-Pivots at the turning gap. Backstitch at beginning and end.

(_{L-Pivots}


- Note: An L-Pivot secures the seam ends when the scarf is turned right side out and helps the seam allowance turn in for hand sewing.
- 6. Turn right side out. Arrange the seam (with gap) along one edge and the fold along the other.
- 7. Next, fold in half widthwise, keeping the seam on one side and the fold on the other.
- 8. Rotate and twist the open end so a seam aligns with a fold on the top and a fold on the bottom.

Note: There are 4 visible layers of Cuddle[®] at the open ends.



- 9. With one hand, hold the center two layers together tightly.
 - Note: The center two layers will have the right sides facing.
- 10. Holding the center layers together with one hand, slide your other hand down one side of the tube. Grab the bottom and pull the tube until it is inside out.


Note: As you reach down, your hand will slide between the wrong *sides of the fabric.*



12. With the tube now inside out, pin the cut edges together, perpendicular to the opening.

Note: If your machine has a free arm, using it will make the next step easier.

13. Sew around the circle.



Finishing

- 1. Pull the entire scarf right side out through the turning gap in the side seam.
 - Note: You now have a scarf with a möbius twist.
- 2. Pin the turning gap closed. Hand sew using a ladder stitch.



Ladder stitch: Using polyester thread and a hand-sewing needle, catch one side of the opening, then the other. Pull to tighten every few stitches.

Cuddle® Basics

- 1. Seam allowances are ½" unless otherwise noted.
- 2. Trace measurements on wrong side of Cuddle® with a felt tip marker or ballpoint pen.
- 3. To help reduce Cuddle® dust, cut Luxe Cuddle® from the reverse side with a rotary cutter or craft knife.
- 4. Shake cut pieces or put in a no-heat dryer with a damp washcloth for a few minutes to remove loose fibers.

- 5. Sew with polyester thread in the top and the bobbin.
- 6. Use 2 rows of pins—the first row every 11/2" along the seam line and a second row 1" to the left and parallel to the cut edge.
- 7. Increase stitch length to 3-4 mm.
- 8. Backstitch at the beginning and end of each seam.
- 9. Use a walking or even-feed foot, if possible. It makes a difference!
